<p style="text-align: center;">Simple sentence</p> <div style="display: flex; justify-content: space-around;"> <div style="border: 1px solid black; padding: 5px; width: 45%;"> <p>Subject A subject is the person or thing 'doing' or 'being' something in a sentence.</p> <p>The cat purred loudly. Clara brushes her hair. My Dad is really tall.</p> </div> <div style="border: 1px solid black; padding: 5px; width: 45%;"> <p>Verb Verbs are 'doing' or 'action' words.</p> <p>She ran to school. They had a really good time talking to each other.</p> </div> </div> <div style="border: 1px solid black; padding: 5px; margin-top: 10px; width: 45%;"> <p>Object An object is a noun, pronoun or noun phrase which comes straight after the verb.</p> <p>I threw balls. I saw you. I ate all the cakes in the kitchen.</p> </div>	<p>Do all of your sentences make sense?</p> <p><i>Do they have a subject (a noun doing the verb), a verb (an action for the subject to do) and an object (for the verb to happen to).</i></p> <p style="color: blue; font-weight: bold; font-size: 1.2em;">The pig ate from the trough.</p>
